Young	• White Rose (led by Hans and Sophie Scholl) hated Hitler because of the crimes that he and the rest of the Nazis had committed.	They printed pamphlets about the Nazi crimes.	Three of them were executed by guillotine. Just before he was executed Hans Scholl shouted out: "Long live freedom!"
	• Swing movement opposed Hitler because he banned jazz music.	They met to dance and play jazz music and they also let Jews into their clubs.	In 1942, clubs were raided and participants were hauled off to camps with beatings and forced labor.
	• Edelweiss Pirates (led by Hans Steinbruck) reacted against the regimentation of the Hitler Youth, which they had evaded by leaving school (which was allowed at age fourteen).	They helped army deserters and refugees and they stole armaments, one group even attacked the Gestapo.	Twelve of them were publicly hanged.
Jews	• Warsaw Ghetto The Jews opposed Hitler because of his policy on persecuting the Jews because they weren't Aryan.	In January 1943, Jews fired upon German troops as they rounded up another group of ghetto inhabitants for deportation.	In May the revolt ended. 56,000 Jews were captured. 7,000 were shot, and the remainder were deported to killing centres.
	• Schindler's list Oskar Schindler opposed the Nazis because he thought it was wrong to kill the Jews.	He saved 1,200 Jews by having them moved to his own factory as 'workers' and gave them food and protection	Schindler succeeded in saving the workers on his list.
Church	The church opposed Hitler as he was trying to replace Christianity with Nazism (Reich Church) and thought that his policies were morally wrong.	Catholics - Cardinal Galen Campaigned strongly against Hitler and the Nazis.	He had his home attacked but he campaigned relentlessly until his natural death.
		Protestants - Bonhoeffer and Niemoller Criticised Nazis in sermons and in poetry.	<ul> <li>Protestants</li> <li>Bonhoeffer was sent to a concentration camp in which he died in 1945.</li> <li>Niemoller was arrested but given a suspended sentence and survived the war.</li> </ul>
Party	• The Bomb Plot Some soldiers always thought Hitler reckless, but it was his failures in Russia after 1941 (esp. Stalingrad) that led to opposition growing.	In 1944 a group of officers tried to kill Hitler in a bomb plot. Von Stauffenberg placed a briefcase with a bomb inside Hitler's headquarters.	Stauffenberg was shot at midnight by a firing squad. Implicated was Erwin Rommel ('The Desert Fox'), who was given poison.
